


2022

(Upper Band, Middle Band, Lower Band, Chewelah Band). Since time immemorial, the Spokane Tribe of Indians has lived and cared for these grounds. Identifying themselves as "sqélixw," or "Flesh of the Earth." We pay our respects to their Elders – past, present, and emerging. We show gratitude to the land, river, and peoples who have been fishing, hunting, harvesting, and gathering here for generations. May we learn from one another's stories, so that we may nurture the relationship of the People of the Spokane Tribe and to all those who share this land.





CENTRAL LIBRARY GRAND OPENING

After a two-year renovation and pandemic closures, Central Library reopened on July 11, fully transformed into a 21st century library.

The enhanced space includes Media Studios, a Business Lab, the Inland Northwest Special Collections, KYRS radio station, New Leaf Café, River Rumpus Children's Playspace, and meeting spaces packed with events, including the Social Stair and the 300-person capacity nxwyxwyetkw Hall.

GROWING A FARM-TO-TABLE VISION AT SHADLE PARK LIBRARY

When Shadle Park Library reopened after renovation in November 2021, an empty plot of land stood outside the Events room. It was hard to picture a thriving educational garden in the space, but over the next months plants flourished and partnerships bloomed.

Throughout 2022, Juan Juan Moses, Community Educator and Master Gardener cultivated both crops and partnerships with Inland Empire Garden Club, WSU Master Gardeners and Master Composters, Vets on the Farm, Water Wise Spokane, Skyhawks Camps, and more.

By the end of the summer, groups were regularly meeting in the garden and events space to learn all about how to grow and prepare your own nutritious foods.

This year, Spokane Public Library joined a growing number of libraries nationwide—from

Denver to Indianapolis—in adding a full-time social worker to the staff.

After observing an increasing need for additional support for some of our customers that is outside the expertise of traditional library staff, a social worker was hired at Central to lead a Welcome Team to better serve the unique needs of customers who may be experiencing life challenges.

Modeled after the highly successful CARES Team at

the Spokane Fire Department, the Welcome Team places interns from Eastern Washington University's social work program into Spokane Public Library to help connect individuals

> with the resources they need. A newly created position for a Social Services Manager with a Master of Social Work supervises the internship hours.

By making this staffing change, the Library is partnering with EWU to make a real difference in our community and ensure that the Library is a welcoming place for all.

Having a social worker on our team has already allowed us to better serve the unique needs of all our customers. The Welcome Team is not only helping people who are

experiencing homelessness, but will also serve any population that may be facing life challenges.

Making an Immediate Impact

At times the social service needs in our community seem insurmountable, but since forming the Welcome Team in mid-2022, we're already seeing small impacts including:

• 'Coffee & Conversations' at Central Library where customers, including those experiencing homelessness, can stop by for coffee, snacks, and conversation.

 Scheduling social service providers at Central Library weekly during Community Court.

- Prepared a resource binder for all service desks so staff are better equipped to connect customers with social services resources.
- Connected seven people with housing.
- Canopy Credit Union created one hundred care packages and donated them to the Library to be handed out to members of our

BRINGING HIGH-END PRODUCTION TO CENTRAL LIBRARY

Getting access to highend production equipment and facilities is often costprohibitive for musicians and creatives, but not anymore in Spokane. With the opening of the Media Studios in Central Library, anyone with a vision and a dream can record and produce on cutting edge equipment for free.

With isolation rooms, a live room, and state-of-the-art soundboard, Spokane citizens can now create the next Grammy-winning album in the **Recording**Studio. Don't know how to play an instrument yet? You can also take music lessons in this space with our Music Education Specialist!

In the **Video Studio**, you can produce films using cameras, editing software, microphones, a teleprompter, and a green screen.

Need a place to meet and record content? Use the **Podcast Studio** to record podcasts, sound bites, and much more. Access state-of-the-art equipment to create your piece.

The Library worked with a local agency, The Woodshop, to develop branding for Lilac City Local, an overarching sub-brand for the library that will showcase all the arts, culture, music, and more produced right here in the Inland Northwest.







HIGHLIGHTS OF THE YEAR 2022

pen hours and programming resumed a normalcy in 2022 that we hadn't seen since early 2020 due to the Covid-19 pandemic. From the re-opening of Central Library after renovation, to growing a farm-to-table program at Shadle Park, to the Library forming a Social Services team, the Library celebrated many accomplishments in 2022.

More Staff Hired

The Library added 30% new staff in 2022, to ramp up for new locations opening, extended hours, and to bring the vision of a 21st century Library to life. The Library added specialized staff such as a youth environmental educator, youth arts educator, adult current affairs specialist and a writing education

specialist. We also added a special events coordinator to better serve those using our expanded event space.



Events Resume

The community sought reconnection at in-person events including 'When Freedom of Expression is at Risk,' a conversation with former Boundary County Library Director Kimber Glidden who resigned after censorship pressures. Other events included Lilac City Live, Silent Writing parties, and many youth programs.



Toward A Greener Future Electric Vehicle (EV) charging stations were installed at The Hive® and Central Library. The Spokane Regional Transportation Council (SRTC) in partnership with Avista and local iurisdictions in Spokane County received a \$2,500,000 grant from the Washington State Department of Commerce to install electric vehicle charging around the region.

Ongoing Bond Construction South Hill and Indian Trail closed in November 2021 to prepare for renovation and were closed for the duration of 2022.

Deepening Partnership with Spokane Public Schools

Spokane Public Library began to manage a central collection that spans across all SPS middle schools and public libraries increasing the quality and size of the collection while stretching the public's dollar. The Library is able to flex the open-source catalog system launched in 2021 to make this a reality. Teen events at the Hillyard library, co-located at Shaw Middle School, are well attended.



Public Art Installation The final piece of permanent art was installed at Shadle Park Library as part of the percentage of public funds committed to the arts. Artist Jasmine Iona Brown of Tacoma, WA, created a multifaceted sculpture of diverse people reading.




DIVERSITY, EQUITY, & INCLUSION

- Staff at all levels met regularly to take a deep dive into Racial Equity Principles with DEI consultant Roo Ramos.

- Staff read and discussed a selection of DEI-related books including: *Disability Visibility, Gender: Your Guide, Evicted*, and *This Chair Rocks*.
